Maritime law enforcement remains an evolving legal field. As new (or renewed) challenges emerge, such as maritime terrorism, piracy, and proliferation of weapons of mass destruction related materials by sea, and continuing challenges escalate (people and drug smuggling by sea), maritime law enforcement has become ever more complex and dynamic.

This seminar will seek to examine this complexity. Focussing upon one of the mainstays of maritime law enforcement – fisheries – the speakers will approach the topic from two different perspectives – international and domestic legal responses, examining a variety of legal issues arising from those responses including the challenges which non-state actors have presented for regulating states.

Chie Kojima teaches the law of the sea, maritime security and marine environmental law at World Maritime University, a UN university established under the auspices of the International Maritime Organization. She holds her doctorate in law from Chuo University, Japan, and her LL.M. and J.S.D. from Yale Law School, USA. From 2005–06, she clerked for Judges Hisashi Owada and Vladlen S. Vereshchetin at the International Court of Justice in The Hague. From 2006–10, she worked as Senior Research Fellow at the Max Planck Institute for Comparative Public Law and International Law in Heidelberg, Germany. Her current research focus is on multi-actor enforcement of international law in maritime security. Chie Kojima is the co-editor of *Solidarity: A Structural Principle of International Law* (together with Rüdiger Wolfrum, Springer, 2010) and the assistant editor of *Law of the Sea, Environmental Law and Settlement of Dispute: Liber Amicorum Judge Thomas A. Mensah* (Tafsir Malick Ndiaye & Rüdiger Wolfrum eds, Martinus Nijhoff Publishers, 2007).



Commander Campbell has been in the Royal Australian Navy for 15 years and specialises in maritime security law and related fields. He is currently the Chief Legal Advisor to Chief of Navy. Prior to this he was the Command Legal Officer at the Border Protection Command (BPC) HQ in Canberra. He also served as a prosecutor in the Office of the Director Military Prosecutions, and was seconded to the NSW Police as a Police prosecutor and the NSW Department of Public Prosecutions.
