# SPEAKER AND CHAIR BIOGRAPHIES

## **Dr Nicholas Aroney**

Nicholas Aroney is Reader in Law and Fellow, Centre for Public, International and Comparative Law at the University of Queensland. He has published extensively in constitutional law, with a particular focus on federalism and implied rights. He is author of *Freedom of Speech in the Constitution* (1998) and his second book, entitled *The Constitution of a Federal Commonwealth: The Making and Meaning of the Australian Constitution*, is due for publication by Cambridge University Press in 2008. He is also working on a further book, to be published by Ashgate Press under the title, *Federal Constitutionalism: Theory and Practice*.

## **Libby Bunyan**

Libby Bunyan is Principal Legal Officer at Native Title Services Victoria, an independent organisation funded by the Australian Government to support and progress native title claims and related activities of behalf of Victorian claimants. She has a Masters Degree in Law from London University and over 15 years experience as a lawyer, primarily in the areas of international human rights law and native title.

## **Jennifer Clarke**

Jennifer Clarke started her legal career as a Northern Territory Aboriginal land claims solicitor. She has continued to research, advise and comment on indigenous legal issues, particularly those relating to land, the history of race-specific 'protection' and 'welfare' legislation, and constitutional issues. She also teaches 'Comparative Race and the Law' with a colleague from the University of Alabama. She is co-author, with Peter Hanks and Patrick Keyzer, of *Australian Constitutional Law: Materials and Commentary* (7<sup>th</sup> ed), to which she contributed chapters on indigenous people and the disadvantaged status of Commonwealth territories.

## **Professor Peter Cane**

Peter Cane is Director of the John Fleming Centre for Advancement of Legal Research in the ANU College of Law. His main research interests are in private law - especially the law of obligations, public law - especially administrative law, and legal theory - especially concepts of responsibility. *Principles of Administrative Law* (co-authored with Leighton McDonald) will be published by OUP in January 2008. He is a Fellow of the British Academy and of the Academy of Social Sciences in Australia.

## **Dr Kyllie Cripps**

Kyllie Cripps, a Indigenous (Palawa) woman, is a CIPHeR Post Doctoral Research Fellow in the *Onemda* VicHealth Koori Health Unit at The University of Melbourne. She has been working in the field of Indigenous family violence and sexual assault for the past 13 years. In 2005 she was awarded her PhD entitled *Enough Family Fighting: Indigenous Community Responses to Addressing Family Violence in Australia & the United States*. She has also been involved in the development of national policy in this area. Her current work focuses on the social context of violence and how policy/programs can support Indigenous communities in responding to the problem.

### **Associate Professor Mary Crock**

Mary Crock came to academia in Sydney in 1995 after completing her PhD in immigration and refugee law. Her main field of research is migration, citizenship and refugee law. However, she has general interests in administrative law and international human rights law as well as in related fields of public law such as constitutional law and public international law. Her specific research interests range from studies of the interaction between Parliament and the judiciary to the legal rights of migrants and refugees in general and of child migrants in particular. She is currently working on an historical and cultural study on the impact that migrants have had on the development of public law in Australia.

### **Professor Timothy Endicott**

Timothy Endicott works in general jurisprudence and constitutional and administrative law. Educated at Harvard, Oxford and Toronto, he practised as a litigation lawyer in Toronto. He has been a Fellow in Law of Balliol College since 1999, Professor of Legal Philosophy since 2006, and Dean of the Law Faculty, University of Oxford, since October 1, 2007.

### **Justin Gleeson SC**

Justin Gleeson graduated from Sydney University with a BA majoring in history in 1981 and LLB First Class Honours and University Medal in 1983, and subsequently with a BCL from Oxford in 1985.

After practice as a solicitor for 4 years he has been a member of the New South Wales Bar since 1989 and senior counsel since 2000. He practices in a broad range of appellate, administrative, constitutional and commercial law. He was editor of Bar News between 2000 and 2004 and a member of the council of the New South Wales Bar Association in 2007.

He co-convened the New South Wales Bar Association's 2007 Rhetoric Seminar Series.

### **Fiona Hanlon**

Fiona Hanlon has held a number of senior management positions in the Victorian public sector. She has extensive experience in the provision of high-level legal and policy advice and in representing government in a broad range of forums, including at the interstate and international intergovernmental level. Fiona recently completed her PhD at the Law School of the University of Melbourne and is now an independent consultant in the areas of governance, policy, regulatory and legislative development and implementation.

### **Geoffrey Kennett**

Geoffrey Kennett has practised as a barrister in Sydney since 1998, specialising in public law. He is a graduate of the ANU Law School and worked for several years as a legal adviser in the Commonwealth Attorney-General's Department, including a stint as Counsel Assisting the Commonwealth Solicitor-General. Geoffrey has published a number of articles and chapters on constitutional law and contributed material to *The Laws of Australia*. He was a commentator at this conference in 1997 and is glad to have been invited back after such a short time!

### **Peggy Kerdo**

Peggy Kerdo is a Senior Solicitor and Section Head of the Human Right & Civil Law Service of Victoria Legal Aid.

Peggy has been working and writing in the area of immigration law since she completed her law degree in 2000. She has a unique insight into the effects of immigration legislation and policy on ordinary people that are in a more vulnerable position than most in the community. She has a keen interest in the use of discretionary powers by the Minister for Immigration.

### **Dr Wendy Lacey**

Wendy Lacey is an Associate Professor at the newly established School of Law at the University of South Australia. She has previously worked at the Universities of Adelaide and Tasmania, having completed her undergraduate studies and PhD at the latter institution. Dr Lacey's research interests cover Australian constitutional and administrative law as well as public international law. Her principal area of research expertise centres, however, on the intersection between international human rights norms and the Australian legal system. Her book, *Implementing Human Rights Norms: Judicial Discretion and Use of Unincorporated Conventions*, will be published by Presidian Legal Publications in February 2008.

### **Professor Geoffrey Lindell**

Geoffrey Lindell has taught and published widely in the field of Australian constitutional law. He has assisted in major reviews of the Australian Constitution and provided constitutional advice to governments and parliaments. He is currently Professorial Fellow at Melbourne University and an Adjunct Law Professor at the Adelaide and Australian National Universities. He was the inaugural Secretary of the Australian Association of Constitutional Law, a body he helped to form.

### **Professor Ron McCallum AO**

Ron McCallum was the foundation Blake Dawson Waldron Professor in Industrial Law in the Faculty of Law of the University of Sydney. He served as Dean of Law from July 2002 to September 2007. He has just retired from the University of Sydney. He is the inaugural President of the Australian Labour Law Association and he has written widely in the field of labour law. In 2006, Professor McCallum was made an Officer in the Order of Australia for labour law services to State Governments and for social justice.

### **Ron Merkel QC**

Ron Merkel QC has been practicing as a barrister since 1971. He became Queens Counsel in 1982 and was appointed Judge of the Federal Court of Australia in 1996, a position he held for ten years. He was founding member of the Victorian Aboriginal Legal Service and founding trustee and treasurer (until 1993) of Koori Aboriginal Heritage Trust. His past positions have included President of the Victorian Council for Civil Liberties, President of the Australian Council for Civil Liberties, Part-time Commissioner of the Commonwealth Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission and Chairman of the Victorian Bar Equality before the Law Committee. He is currently Patron of the Koorie Heritage Trust, the Australian Indonesian Legal Foundation, the Anna Wearne Trust and The East West Foundation.

### **Mark Moshinsky**

Mark Moshinsky is a Barrister at the Victorian Bar, specialising in constitutional and administrative law, taxation, private international law, and general commercial law. He completed a BCL at Oxford University in 1991. He has appeared in a number of constitutional cases, including the *Attorney-General v Andrews* (2007), *NSW v Commonwealth* (Workplace Relations Act Case) (2006), *Sweedman v TAC* (2006), *Permanent Trustee v Commissioner of State Revenue* (2004) and *Austin v Commonwealth* (2003).

### **Heather Roberts**

Heather Roberts is an Associate Lecturer at the ANU College of Law. Her current research interest lies in Deane J's vision of the Constitution.

### **Professor Kim Rubenstein**

Kim Rubenstein took up her position as Professor and Director of the Centre for International and Public Law in the ANU College of Law in 2006. In that role she has been keen to emphasise the links between public and international law, both through her own research work on citizenship and nationality and through a CIPL series linking the disciplines which began this year. She is a Barrister and Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Victoria, and the High Court of Australia and a legal practitioner of the ACT Supreme Court. She has appeared in several High Court citizenship matters, the most recent being *Re MIMIA; Ex parte Ame* [2005]. Kim is the author of *Australian Citizenship Law in Context* (2002, Lawbook Company).

### **Amelia Simpson**

Amelia Simpson is a Senior Lecturer in the ANU College of Law and a Member of the Centre for International and Public Law. Her publications span a range of constitutional doctrines and issues, most recently with a particular focus on the High Court's constitutional discrimination jurisprudence. Amelia is a JSD candidate at Columbia University.

### **James Stellios**

James Stellios is a Senior Lecturer at the ANU College of Law. His primary research field is constitutional law, and he has published widely in that area. Prior to joining the ANU College of Law in July 2001, he spent a number of years in legal practice working for the Attorney-General's Department and the Australian Government Solicitor, principally in the area of constitutional litigation. Immediately prior to joining the ANU College of Law, he worked as Counsel Assisting the Solicitor-General of the Commonwealth, and appeared as junior counsel for the Commonwealth in a number of constitutional cases before the High Court of Australia. James is also a Consultant to Clayton Utz.

### **Dr Iain Stewart**

Senior Lecturer, department of Law, Division of Law, Macquarie University. Formerly lecturer in Sociology and in Law, University of Hull, England. PhD in Law, University College London 1982; Diplome de Droit Comparé, Faculté Internationale pour l'Enseignement du Droit Comparé, 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> cycles, 1968; LLB(Hons), University of Exeter 1969. Articles on concept of law, Kelsen's 'pure theory of law', sociology of law, comparative law, constitutional law and Montesquieu.

**Daniel Stewart**

Daniel Stewart teaches and researches in areas at the intersection of public and private law. He has an LLM from the University of Virginia and is currently completing a doctorate on judicial review at the limits of the public sphere. He has published in areas including Administrative Law, Intellectual Property and Corporations Law, with his most recent publication being '*Griffith University v Tang*, "Under an Enactment" and Limiting Access to Judicial Review' (2005) 33(3) *Federal Law Review* 525-544.

**Professor Michael Taggart**

Mike Taggart has taught at the University of Auckland Law School since 1982, and is the first holder of the Alexander Turner Chair in Law. He has written extensively on administrative and public law, privatisation and the public/private law divide

**Professor Margaret Thornton**

Margaret Thornton is Professor of Law in the ANU College of Law, Australian National University. Her research interests are in the areas of discrimination law and policy, legal education, the legal profession and feminist legal theory. Her present project, 'EEO in a Climate of Uncertainty' is supported by an ARC Australian Professorial Fellowship. She is also a Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences in Australia and a Foundation Fellow of the Australian Academy of Law.

**Dr Anne Twomey**

Anne Twomey is a constitutional lawyer and an Associate Professor in Law at the University of Sydney. She has previously worked for the High Court of Australia, the Commonwealth Parliamentary Research Service, the Senate Legal and Constitutional Committee and The Cabinet Office (NSW). She has published widely in the area of constitutional law, including a book on *The Constitution of New South Wales*. Her latest book is *The Chameleon Crown – The Queen and Her Australian Governors*, and her next book will be on the *Australia Acts 1986*.

**Professor Peter Veth**

Peter Veth has completed long-term studies on the emergence of desert and maritime Indigenous societies in the Indo-Pacific region. He has published 10 books and monographs on topics such as Desert Hunter Gatherers of the World, First Coastal Contacts and Archaeology and Native Title. Peter is Deputy-Director of the National Centre for Indigenous Studies, ANU College of Law under the Chair of Professor Mick Dodson, is past Director of Research at AIATSIS and has been a University teacher, heritage regulator and consultant and Expert Witness for native title cases in the Federal Court. He is a Fellow of the Academy of the Humanities.

**Dr Fiona Wheeler**

Fiona Wheeler is a Reader in the ANU College of Law. She has served as College Sub-Dean and is currently College Director of Research as well as a member of numerous College and University committees. She teaches Foundations of Australian Law and Commonwealth Constitutional Law. Dr Wheeler's research is primarily in the area of constitutional law, with a particular interest in courts and the judicial system, including separation of powers. She is also currently a Chief Investigator on an ARC Linkage Grant Project that is conducting an oral history of the High Court.

**David Yarrow**

David Yarrow is a lecturer at the Monash University Faculty of Law. For many years, he has worked with Indigenous organisations throughout Australia on a variety of land management issues and particularly native title claims. He has published on Indigenous rights law in Australia and Canada.

**Matthew Zagor**

Matthew Zagor teaches in public, environmental, human rights and refugee law at the ANU. He has a degree in Religious Studies with Social Anthropology from the School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London, and an LLB from the UNSW. After several years as Amnesty Australia's refugee coordinator and government liaison officer, Matthew practiced as a solicitor in community legal centres and the Commonwealth Legal Aid Commission, primarily representing asylum-seekers. As a federal public servant, he worked at the Migration Review Tribunal (MRT) and the Attorney General's Department. He was a part-time Member on the MRT ('03-'06), and a Visiting Fellow at the LSE in 2006.
