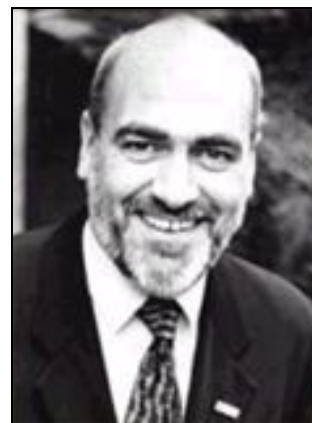

Tim McCormack is the Foundation Australian Red Cross Professor of International Humanitarian Law (appointed 1996) at the Melbourne Law School, The University of Melbourne and the Foundation Director of the Asia Pacific Centre for Military Law - a collaborative initiative (established 2001) between the University of Melbourne Law School and The Australian Defence Force Legal Service. He acted as amicus curiae on international law matters to the judges of Trial Chamber III of the International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia (ICTFY) in The Hague for the trial of Slobodan Milošević from November 2002 to March 2006.

Professor McCormack will discuss the trial process in light of Milosevic's four-year trial and consider the impact of his death on the Court and for justice in the Former Yugoslavia.
