Tony Blackshield is an Emeritus Professor at Macquarie University and an Adjunct Professor at the ANU and UNSW. He holds a masters degree in law from the University of Sydney. He has had a long interest in, and has written extensively about, the High Court as an institution and the nature of the judicial process. He is well known as a commentator on constitutional law, international law, and jurisprudence, among other areas. His works include, as coeditor, *The Judgments of Justice Lionel Murphy* (1986) and, as coauthor, *Australian Constitutional Law and Theory: Commentary and Materials* (2nd edn 1998).

Michael Coper is Dean of Law and Professor of Constitutional Law at the ANU. A graduate in Arts and Law from the University of Sydney, he was a founding member of the Faculty of Law at UNSW. He was appointed to the Inter-State Commission in 1988, and, following the demise of the Commission, worked in private practice in Canberra from 1991 to 1995. He is the author of numerous books and articles on constitutional law, including the prize-winning *Freedom of Interstate Trade Under the Australian Constitution* (1983) and *Encounters with the Australian Constitution* (1987, popular edn 1988). He has appeared as counsel in a number of High Court cases, including the landmark case of *Cole v Whitfield* (1988). In 1999, he was elected to membership of the American Law Institute.

George Williams is the Anthony Mason Professor and Director of the Gilbert & Tobin Centre of Public Law at UNSW. He was formerly based at the ANU. He has an economics degree and a law degree from Macquarie University, a masters degree in law from UNSW, and a PhD from the ANU. He has worked at the High Court as associate to Justice Michael McHugh and as a barrister has appeared in a number of High Court cases, including the *Hindmarsh Island Bridge Case* (1998). His books include *Human Rights Under the Australian Constitution* (1999) and *A Bill of Rights for Australia* (2000). He is a well-known media commentator on constitutional law issues and the High Court.
