

Successful appointees from the 2008 appointment round announced



Acting Law Dean, Professor Stephen Bottomley has announced seven appointments as a result of the ANU College of Law's annual appointment round for 2008. In congratulating the appointees, he also extended them a warm welcome to the ANU College of Law. As in past years, the competition for appointments this year was especially strong. Professor Bottomley noted with regret, that there were other very fine candidates for whom the College could not find a place in this year's round.

The three external appointees, Moeen Cheema, Dominique Dalla Pozza and Cameron Roles, will commence teaching at the ANU College of Law in 2009.

Moeen Cheema

As an Assistant Professor at the Lahore University of Management Sciences (LUMS), Pakistan (2004–2008), Moeen teaches in the Law & Policy program. In addition he has been pursuing his research interests in Islamic criminal laws, administrative laws, comparative constitutional frameworks and corporate governance. He has also undertaken policy work on land and housing rights issues arising in the aftermath of the 2005 earthquake and actively participated in the lawyers' movement for the restoration of the judiciary in Pakistan. Moeen will join the College as a Teaching Fellow in January 2009.

Dominique is currently completing her PhD with the Gilbert + Tobin Centre of Public Law at the Faculty of Law at the University of New South Wales. The focus of her PhD is the counter-terrorism legislation passed by the Australian Federal Parliament in the period 11 September 2001 to 11 September 2006. She has also enjoyed teaching Public Law at the Faculty of Law at UNSW. After finishing her undergraduate studies and prior to commencing her doctorate, Dominique worked at the Sydney office of a large commercial law firm. During this time she qualified to practice as a lawyer in NSW. Dominique will commence as an Associate Lecturer in June 2009.

Cameron Roles

Cameron comes to the ANU following a successful career as a lecturer at the University of Wollongong. His areas of expertise include employment and workplace law, public sector employment law and the law relating to occupational health and safety. Prior to his appointment at the University of Wollongong, Cameron was a lawyer for a Commonwealth Government entity, providing specialist advice on public sector employment law. Cameron has also been employed as a workplace relations lawyer in private legal practice. He will take up a position as a Lecturer in January 2009.

Also within the same round, Andrew Macintosh has been appointed for an extended term as Associate Director of the Centre for Climate Law and Policy.

Glenda Bloomfield

Glenda has been appointed as a Lecturer in the College. She is an experienced practitioner in both New South Wales and Australian Capital Territory jurisdictions. She has worked in both the Government and the private sector for many years. Glenda has taught at the University of Canberra, and in the Legal Workshop, ANU in various capacities in Wills, Probate and other areas since 1987, and teaches undergraduate courses in Succession, Property and Lawyers Justice and Ethics.

Tony Foley

Tony is a candidate for a Ph.D in law at the Regulatory Institutions Network (Regnet) at the ANU. He is currently completing his dissertation examining justice responses to criminal wrongdoing through the lens of restorative justice. He has written and practiced principally in the area of environmental conflict resolution. His other research interests include professional legal education, legal practice and interpreters and the law. He has been appointed to an Associate Professorship.

Lyn Du Moulin

Lynn is a part-time instructor at the ANU Legal Workshop, teaching Government Law Practice and Administrative Law Practice courses since 1995 and related elective courses from 1995 to 2000. She is a practising government lawyer with a Commonwealth government statutory agency, specialising in government commercial law, including IT, IP and ecommerce law. Lyn has been appointed as a Senior Lecturer.

Andrew Macintosh

Andrew is an environmental law and policy expert. Prior to his new appointment as a Senior Lecturer, he has tutored in law at several colleges at Cambridge University and has worked as a legal officer at Cambridge City Council. Prior to joining the ANU College of Law, Andrew was Deputy Director of The Australia Institute and has previously worked as an environmental advisor to the Australian Democrats. He has written extensively on environmental law and policy, particularly climate change.

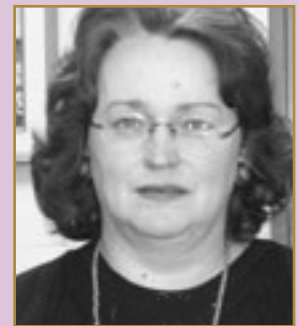

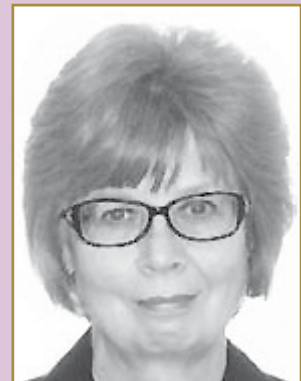
